MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF NETCONG HELD MARCH 10, 2016 AT THE NETCONG MUNICIPAL BUILDING, 23 MAPLE AVENUE, NETCONG, NEW JERSEY COMMENCING AT 7:30 P.M.

Mayor Nametko called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

CORRESPONDENCE

No correspondence was presented at this meeting.

BOROUGH ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

1. Mr. Blakeslee wanted to comment on the rental registration program. Hackettstown is continuing their program by having registration and fees paid, but with no inspections. He would like to know if our attorney could do research on this issue. He is afraid we will lose progress on this activity if we don't move forward. Bob Oostdyk asked what the fee covers. Mr. Blakeslee replied that we never said the fee was for inspection, it was to register. The Mayor added that the reason we ask for rental registration was not to do inspections it was to monitor the properties and conditions in these homes. It is important for us to know where the rentals are. Mr. Blakeslee said it helps us to get in between tenants to check for property maintenance issues. He would like to know if there is some way to do this without being in violation.

Bob Oostdyk replies that the town can still do inspections with tenant changes. Mr. Blakeslee said Netcong Heights will not participate if we continue.

Councilman Sylvester suggested we change our rates for change of occupancy. Bob Oostdyk said we need to charge what the cost is for the inspections. This should not be a money making situation.

With Netcong Heights we are more aware of tenants moving in there than before this program. Councilman Hathaway commented that if we keep doing registration we would be able to see name changes. Maybe charge less for yearly registration and up changes. There are laws that allow us to check changes of tenants. Mr. Oostdyk will do research on this legislation.

Councilman Laureys asked for an explanation on why we are holding non occupied properties to a higher standard than owner occupied. The Mayor explained this also protects the tenants who are renting. Therefore, the landlord has to provide the minimum. Councilman Laureys felt that this was discriminatory to landlords. The difference is that the legislature feels when someone owns their home they have a vested interest in that property, tenants do not have that interest.

2. Memo for animal control officer: Mr. Blakeslee had a conversation with Mt. Olive. He provided the details of that call. The cost would be significantly more than what we are paying our employee. There may be some other things we can look at over the course of the year to improve this situation.

The Mayor noted that he spoke with the Mayor of Stanhope regarding this topic. She responded that they use Hopatcong at approximately 200 dollars per call. They are also looking for other options.

Councilman Laureys asked what the savings would be. Mr. Blakeslee replied that it only covers the cost of the keeping of the animals.

Councilman Hathaway reported that the Quirk property has reached further agreement with Crown Point. They will continue environmental work so construction can begin. They are now working with planner and will now go to the Planning Board. In addition, they have been productive in their work with the DEP for a drainage solution.

There was a meeting with New Jersey Transit a month ago, they have changed their posture on their properties and will be asking for bid proposals for the sale of their properties to developers. Paul Phillips our planner is currently going over the proposal with the town's interests in mind. New Jersey Transit wants to have a selected bidder by the summer. At present Councilman Hathaway thinks this all looks like a good plan however everything is subject to change because it is transit.

Another developer expressed interested in the Pocketbook Factory property. It is on hold for now. Crown Point is moving along.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR TO THE COUNCIL

Council President – posed a question about the time frame for ordinances. The Mayor and Council responded.

Councilman Laureys – noted that the SID cost estimate expense portion was not itemized. Why is it not done as in previous years? Councilman Hathaway explained this is just an estimate not the actual budget. Councilman Hathaway noted it would be prudent for the SID not to disclose everything due to possible criticism.

Councilman Sylvester — was looking into legislation that involves PILOT programs and sharing of those funds with other entities sponsored by our districts legislators. We need to put together a letter with our objections and get supports from other towns. Councilman Hathaway made some calls and found it does not affect them at this time. This could come at a significant cost if this passes. Councilman Still said larger cities will support this. Councilman Hathaway says we should let the League know. The Mayor said our attorney does not get it. This is the tool to use to get developers to come to your town. Jason Gabloff says he will go to the finance officers and league to let them know this is happening as the Mayors in every town need to grow this as a tool to use. Everything in the state goes up 2 ½ percent yrt the towns have to stay under 2%. Councilman Still offered that a resolution can be composed by Fred Semrau and sent out. The Mayor noted that he would write our attorney.

Councilman Hathaway wished to report that the school fundraiser went very well and \$10,000 was raised. The event was very well attended. The goal is for a chrome book for every child from 2nd grade and up. Councilman Hathaway also wanted to report that the Lake Board completed the 319 Grant. Local legislators with the exception of Mike Carroll responded with support. Councilman Hathaway also received a really excellent letter of support from the chairman of the Environmental Commission.

Councilman Still - asked if Jason Gabloff would come up and talk about budget.

Mr. Jason Gabloff provided a summary of the budget. He maintained that the town is in good financial condition.

The Mayor reported that the committee found that the town needs to control the capital budget in the future. Our reserves are slowly going down. We need to slow down on capital spending and build our reserves. We are contributing funds in savings for upcoming needs. We are small and have over eight hundred thousand in debt. Mr. Gabloff has started a plan to prepare for the needs of DPW and Police. Many towns don't think ahead. Our finance committee does which is beneficial.

The Mayor noted that the town may see an increase in our water collection fees this year. An audit will be conducted in April or May. The committee would like to check a few things before the water report is complete.

The Mayor also noted that PILOT funding would help to pay down the Infrastructure loan which was the original plan.

2.
