MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF NETCONG HELD DECEMBER 7, 2023 AT THE NETCONG MUNICIPAL BUILDING, 23 MAPLE AVENUE, NETCONG, NEW JERSEY COMMENCING AT 7:30 PM.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Nametko at 7:30 PM.

PUBLIC PORTION OF MEETING

Mr. Matthew Eddy, 25 Flanders Rd. stated that there are 18 wheelers on Flanders Rd. using jake brakes at all hours of the day and night. He is concerned they will run into one of the houses. He made a suggestion to talk to Isolatek. The trucks do not have to travel on Flanders Rd. The mayor stated we have signs on a number of streets to not allow jake brakes. There was discussion among the Council regarding possible solutions for this. He would like to know if the town could speak with Isolatek about finding an entrance coming off of Love Lane. Mr. Blakeslee stated the borough has several meetings with Isolatek and he thinks there would not be a problem to speak with them about a solution to this issue. There was further conversation on this subject. Councilman Sylvester said this will be a topic of conversation at the public safety meeting next week. The mayor stated they will bring up the topic of Flanders Rd. as well at the next public safety meeting.

Mr. Eddie said there are also vehicles that speed on Flanders Rd. as well as knock down mail boxes. He thanked the Council for their time.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR TO THE COUNCIL

The Council President also thanked the employees for getting the fireworks done.

Councilman Sylvester had several comments. He is concerned about Allen Terrace. He does not want the vendor to be paid. They need to come back in the spring and mill and repave.

Councilman Sylvester also had questions about The Bank St. parking lot (previously the bank drive-thru)— he wanted to know how many spaces are dedicated to the bank building. He thought there were 12 spots dedicated to the bank building. However, it appears there are only 4. Councilman Sylvester wants to know what we can do to change that. Councilman Sylvester stated that he was not happy about this. Councilman Albensi gave an explanation on what he thought was decided. Mr. Blakeslee gave details on his understanding of the parking. There was supposed to be flex parking. Councilman Hathaway stated Paul Phillips will be here next week so the question can be asked then. There was further discussion among the Council on this subject. The mayor asked Mr. Blakeslee to contact Mr. Philips, the Borough Planner so he can prepare an answer for these questions at next week's meeting.

He also had an issue regarding the speed bumps on Allen Terrace. He feels this is another engineering issue that he would like corrected as well. The mayor asked when we should have a letter from our borough attorney. The mayor asked Mr. Blakeslee to contact our attorney tomorrow.

Councilman Hathaway stated the lake will be filled starting next Friday, December 15th. It will be a slow process.

MAYORS COMMENTS

The mayor stated he had the opportunity to take the carolers around to the restaurants in town on Sunday night. They were very well received. He posted some pictures on Facebook. The owners and managers of the businesses came out to meet the carolers.

Mr. Blakeslee wanted to thank Mr. Canfield and the DPW for getting the new garbage cans disbursed to all the residents in a timely manner.

PROCLAMATION

PUBLIC PORTION OF MEETING

Mr. Matthew Eddy, 25 Flanders Rd., stated that regarding Ordinance 2023-21st: St. Michael's Church, wanted to let the Council know that most of the town residents do not want apartments there. The residents would prefer single family homes. He gave several reasons why this is something that should not occur. He understands housing is needed but the residents don't want the apartments. He gave further comments on this issue. Councilman Laureys wanted to speak with Mr. Eddy about this issue. He gave his opinion on the possible apartment complex and that he agrees with Mr. Eddy. Mr. Eddy stated he moved here for the family atmosphere. He feels if this apartment complex is built, that will no longer exist. Councilman Sylvester stated his fear is that we have already lost it. Mr. Eddy stated it is not lost yet, and gave reasons for that. He appreciated the Council's time on this issue.

Mr. John Parks, 26 Hilts Lane, is here to say he agrees with Mr. Eddy. He is here about his road again. He knows Mr. Blakeslee has reached out to NJ Transit and they have come to investigate but have not solved the issue. The water is now running into Maple Ave. The mayor asked what NJ Transit is going to do to fix this. It has been established this is a fairly simple fix according to our DPW superintendent. However, NJ Transit has not corrected the issue. Councilman Sylvester asked that Mr. Bucco, our attorney, write a letter to NJ Transit to get this situation corrected. Councilman Sylvester will call our legislators tomorrow. The mayor stated we are working on it. Mr. Parks thanked the Council. Mr. Blakeslee stated this is not on borough property, it is on NJ Transit so they will have to correct it.

Councilman Hathaway stated this is a public safety issue, which is the best way to get this repaired especially since the winter is here causing icing issues. The Council understands this is a problem and they will keep working at getting it repaired. Mr. Blakeslee said he would follow up tomorrow

A Motion to Close the Meeting to the Public was made by Councilman Laureys and seconded by Councilman Hathaway.

Resolution 2023-101

WHEREAS: Local Government is facing the largest budget increase for property/casualty insurance since the mid-1980s; and

WHEREAS: The property/casualty budget for the typical municipality has already experienced a 20% to 25% increase since 2021 and will experience another 12% to 20% increase in 2024; and

WHEREAS: New Jersey now has the highest workers' compensation premium rates in the country based on data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; and

WHEREAS: Workers' Compensation escalated because New Jersey judges are now reopening cases up to four and five times, whereas in the past they rarely reopened a case more than once; and

WHEREAS: Workers' Compensation also escalated because of a 2021 Department of Labor decision that directed workers' compensation to pay many accidental disability claims that previously were paid by the pension plans; and

WHEREAS: Another recent law created a presumption that firefighters diagnosed with cancer are eligible for workers' compensation; and

WHEREAS: During the COVID 19 Pandemic, the Legislature approved a law that made COVID contracted by first responders and essential employees compensable under New Jersey's workers' statute resulting in the COVID cost per employee being the second highest in the country; and

WHEREAS: Liability has increased because of the erosion of Title 59 protections in New Jersey's courts. Judges are now reluctant to grant summary judgement dismissing even frivolous claims because of the 2021 New Jersey Supreme Court decision in <u>Gonzalez v. Jersey City</u>; and

WHEREAS: The recent amendment in the sexual molestation statute of limitations also increased Title 59 liability costs. In some cases, towns are being sued based on allegations going back to the 1970s; and

WHEREAS: Property premiums are increasing rapidly because the world-wide frequency of large natural disasters has almost tripled since 2000. New Jersey alone was hit with Hurricane Irene in 2011, Superstorm Sandy in 2012 and Tropical Storm Ida in 2021; and

WHEREAS: Property insurance premiums are also indexed to replacement values that have jumped because of supply chain issues and the labor shortage; and

WHEREAS: Cyber liability premiums have more than doubled in recent years. Organizations without strong cyber risk controls are finding it difficult to purchase any coverage.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF NETCONG THAT:

- 1) The Legislature is urged to adopt budget and levy cap exemptions for property/casualty insurance and claims; and
- 2) The Administration and the Legislature should not adopt additional legislation or regulations that will increase municipal claims without a thorough and complete analysis of the cost; and
- 3) The New Jersey Department of Labor, the New Jersey Department of Banking and Insurance and the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs should meet with representatives of municipal government to discuss ways to reduce property/casualty costs.
